

MARCUS HOOK NAMED "TREE CITY USA" FOR THE 39TH STRAIGHT YEAR

The National Arbor Day Foundation has once again named Marcus Hook Borough a "Tree City USA," marking the thirty ninth successive year that Marcus Hook has received this national recognition. The Tree City USA honor comes from the National Arbor Day Foundation, a Nebraskabased organization dedicated to encouraging tree care and tree planting programs across the country.

Communities entering the nationwide program receive the Tree City USA designation upon recommendation by the State Bureau of Forestry. Communities qualify which meet the following standards: a municipal tree ordinance, a legal tree governing body, a comprehensive urban shade tree program with an annual budget of at least \$2 per capita, and the annual observance of Arbor Day.

Tree City USA communities receive a flag with the program's logo and walnut-mounted plaque. Winners also receive Tree City USA community signs.

The Borough received the Tree City USA flag and other recognition materials at it's annual Arbor Day program that was held on Friday, April 26 at Robert Haebel Plaza at 10th and Plaza Street. An evergreen tree was planted in the park. Students from the Marcus Hook Elementary School will be attended and participated in the program. Our very own Bruce Dorbian, Marcus Hook Borough's Planning and Zoning officer presented the Borough with its Tree City USA recognition materials and gave a talk on the value of trees in our urban communities.

A community's tree planting program is a living memorial to the citizen's concern for the quality of life. The Tree City USA award is an excellent indication that the tree care responsibilities are being taken seriously. The Borough's shade tree program is indicative of the community improvements that have been advanced in recent years. It reflects a commitment to an effective, ongoing program marked by growth and renewal.

PARK IMPROVEMENTS — MARKET SQUARE MEMORIAL PARK

Construction activities at Market Square Memorial Park wrapped up in June. The Market Square Memorial Park Riverfront Enhancement Project provided an upgrade and improvements to the cove area where the park meets the Delaware River. The purpose of this project was riverbank stabilization and reestablishment of the area where the existing gabion baskets end. Stabilization consisted of installing a 12' wide reinforcement geotextile mat at the top of the riverbank, covered by soil and grass, and placing large rock rip-rap above the existing gabion mattress area. Protective concrete curbing was constructed along the top of the river bank and a new black clad chain link fence installed on top of the concrete curb. The area around the cove disturbed by the construction activity was landscaped with trees and turf grass. The project also included the installation of 25 decorative steel bollards replacing older wood bollards. The contractor was Albert G. Cipolloni, Jr. & Sons. Project funding came from the Delaware County Green Ways Municipal Grant Program - 3rd round.

Some modest flooding over the years has contributed to the erosion and unevenness of the park edge at this location. In this section of the riverfront park there has been deterioration over time at the point where the gabion wire baskets, first installed in 1988, meet the flat park land at the top of the riverbank. Wave and tidal action from the river can be damaging over time requiring a strong bank stabilization response.

The improvements to Market Square Memorial Park will help preserve and protect this important resource maintaining the viability of the park and its continuing use by area residents.

This project will enhance the environmental and recreational value of the town's riverfront park. The park connects people with nature simply by its location on the Delaware River. The Delaware River is a major water resource for drinking water, and recreation comes into focus when you are viewing boat traffic on the river or out spending time on the river.

Market Square Memorial Park has had a positive economic benefit in the community. The mere existence of the park has stabilized and improved market values of property in the neighborhood. It has become the springboard project launching redevelopment initiatives in the neighborhood and community including new single family housing.

HOW TO TRICK OR TREAT SAFELY

You and your family can have a fun and spooky night of trick-or-treating if you keep a few general things in mind to stay safe, for instance:

- Walk don't run from house to house using sidewalks when possible
- Be aware of and avoid open flames like candles in jack-o'-lanterns
- Avoid homemade treats and only eat factory-wrapped candy
- Remove your child's makeup soon after trick-or-treating to avoid skin irritation

There are more ways to help make sure trick-or-treating is a worry-free evening. Our handy list of safety tips for

Halloween is great to review before the big night out so everyone can focus on fun. Here's what to keep in mind:

FOLLOW THE RULES OF THE ROAD

While the lure of a decorated house across the street can be tempting, it's important to stay on track and cross only at corners or in crosswalks. Remind the kiddos to look both ways to check for traffic. And, if you'll be behind the wheel, make sure to go beyond normal <u>safe driving habits</u> — it's smart to be extra vigilant for everyone's safety.

GO IN GROUPS

Not only is traveling in a pack safer, but it's also more fun! While you may want to keep your family together for health safety, if you do allow your children to stray from your pod, here are some guidelines to follow:

- Children under 12 should have an adult along to supervise.
- If a child is old enough to trick-or-treat without an adult, they should still go with a group of friends and stick to familiar houses and neighborhoods.
- If you have a group of older children heading out alone, consider turning on a mobile tracker app so you can follow their progress from home.

If your kids are going out on their own, set up a timeline expectation. For instance, have the kids check in at specific times throughout the night and set a curfew.

BE VISIBLE

Reflective tape should be used as much as possible on costumes, candy bags, strollers and wagons. Consider bringing glow sticks and flashlights as well. This tip is two-fold. You want to be visible to others, so they see you crossing the street or coming down the sidewalk, and you'll appreciate the extra light when trying to maneuver up unfamiliar steps, sidewalks and streets. ENSURE YOUR CHILD'S COSTUME IS SAFE

In addition to adding reflective elements to costumes, check that they're easy to walk in and don't restrict breathing or vision.

If your child is going as a pirate, warrior princess or anything with a pointy accessory like a sword, make sure it isn't a safety hazard. Choose accessories made of soft foam over hard plastic so if your trick-or-treaters get into a battle, they won't be harmed.


